

A Special Thank You... From One Veteran To Another







<u>Update from Pastor Francis who</u> serves in Malawi.

Below is a brief summary of Compassionate Mission Center's Newsletter, whose

organization Wesley Chaple provides support. If you'd like to read the entire article, please see the church's bulletin board. Thank you and God bless.

Compassionate Mission Center (CMC) is a faith based local, non-political, non-profit making organization whose mission is to promote the lives of the under-privileged common Malawians i.e., orphans, women, the elderly, the youth. The ultimate goal is to eliminate poverty, hunger, disease, illiteracy, and suffering.

The Orphanage: It takes 3500 USD every month for us to run the orphanage. This includes food, basic needs like soap, lotion, toiletries, tooth paste and brushes, clothes, fire wood for cooking, electricity and water. Sometimes a meal at a time, trusting the Lord just to bring the next meal in time. We currently have 93 children at the Center.

Let There Be light: Sara Biard, CEO for Let There Be Light International has been instrumental in making sure we provide solar lights to the poor of the poorest in our communities. These are people who struggle to light their homes. A solar light costs 8 USD and many more are needed.

Food Aid: CMC is in need of a lot of food to feed the hungry this year. A 50kgs bag of maize is selling at 60 USD. A 50kgs bag of rice is selling at 89 USD. Food prices are up. Please join hands to feed the hungry.

Housing the Homeless: There is a great need to have the homeless housed. The child headed families, the orphans, the ederly, the sick...with 1700 USD we can build a habitable house. Our other focus is church buildings that are in need of roofs.

People Living with Disabilities: During our outreaches, we assess people living with disabilities. They are from different far reached areas. Some must visit the hospital more that 4 times. It takes 200 USD to transport them per trip and 270 USD to buy a wheelchair.

This century women and girls are being raped because they are waking up in the wee hours in search of water. Children and mothers are drowning in rivers and cisterns as they fetch water. Goats, cows, pigs and sheep are drinking from the same spot with people. With 3500 USD we can drill a new well.
