Sunday ~ December 1

COMPASSION

Read: Colossians 3:12-13

In the Webster Dictionary, compassion is defined as a feeling of sympathy or pity or to have great sorrow for the sufferings or trouble of another or others, <u>accompanied by an urge to</u> <u>help</u>.



Recently, during my travels into New York City, delivering cabinetry and furniture to various stores for Jason; I have noticed a substantial increase in the number of homeless and destitute people. These people are there for a variety of reasons; it may be drug or alcohol addiction or mental illness, it may be ex-military that have not adjusted to civilian life after returning from the war-front, or it could be they just run upon hard times and in some cases, it is obvious, they are illegal aliens corralled and contained in specific areas.

Regardless of the "why" they are there, it is a situation that no one seems to have any concern. The people working and living in the city step over or walk around these people, laying on the sidewalks or in doorways; some covered with cardboard, tarps or make-shift tents or a few laying on and under all their earthly possessions and others laying totally exposed to the weather with no cover or protection at all.

Where is the caring nature of those that live and work in the city? Where is the consideration of governmental officials? Where is the empathy of our federal agencies with programs and funding? Where is the loving kindness of the churches to meet the needs of the poor and down-trodden? Where are you and I to show the compassion to those in need, as GOD and Christ have shown compassion to us?

Let me remind you, that we as a people of GOD and followers of Jesus Christ are called to search out those in need and provide to them as has been provided to us. This is emphasized in Chapter 25 of Matthew as Jesus is instructing the disciples and explaining the basis of final judgement; summarized in Matthew 25:45: 'Truly I say to you, to the extent that you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to Me. "These will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."

Colossians 3:12-13

So, as those who have been chosen of God, holy and beloved, put on a heart of compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience; bearing with one another, and forgiving each other, whoever has a complaint against anyone; just as the Lord forgave you, so also should you.

"Enter through the narrow gate. For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it. But small is the gate and narrow the road that leads to life, and only a few find it."

"The hardest thing for a Christian to do is to be a Christian outside of church. There are times when sin is not only easier, but also more fun. and it will make certain people like you. Having people around you who don't believe in Christ makes it very difficult to be a strong follower of Him. How does God feel about all of this? There are few people in the world who will get to heaven due to the narrow path described in Matthew 7:13-Staying on the path and getting people to join you, especially if you 14. don't like them, is very hard. Jesus was a gift to all people, and gifts as great as He is are meant to be shared. Sharing Christ with people we don't get along with can be challenging, and it's harder to talk to them. Tuesday ~ December 3

JESUS DOES NOT NEED MY BOAT

Read: Matthew 14:25

Matthew 14:25 says, "During the fourth watch of the night Jesus went out to them, walking on the lake." This seems like a straightforward Scripture, but the part that challenges me is this: Jesus does not need my boat.

Our boat is anything we possess that enables us to do our job, fulfill our calling and arrive at out God-chosen destination. It could be our experiences, titles, education, salary, family connections or possessions. But Jesus, after making disciples get into the boat and encounter a storm, walked across the water to be with them. Jesus did not need their boat.

Too often we (which means, of course, primarily me) assume that God has brought us to this certain place, endowed us with these certain gifts, allowed us to experience those particular things because He is going to use them for this particular purpose. But we deceive ourselves when we think we have the plans of God all figured out. Jesus does not need our boat.

There was a time, of course, when Jesus chose to use our boat. In Luke 5:1-3, Jesus used Peter's boat in order to teach the crowds that had gathered around Him. Afterward, Jesus instructed Peter to go back out and fish, even though they had fished all night and caught nothing. Their catch after obeying the Lord was so large it almost sank Peter's boat (Luke 5:7).

Later in our walk with Jesus, He shows us He has other means of accomplishing the purposes of God for our life. He wants us to grow beyond the safety and security of our known talents and abilities. Jesus wants us to learn that just about the time we think we've go the methods and motives of God figured out, He purposely sends us into a storm so that He can scare the wits out of us by appearing in a form we least expect.

Sometimes the storm is a financial scare so He can appear in the form

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of our Provider. We thought we were providing everything for our family, but God reminds us that everything we have comes from Him (1 Chron. 29:14)

Other times we think it is our education or vocational connections that will land us that career we've always wanted, but then a call comes from someone we don't know and we enter into a career we never imagined.

After four years of Bible College and two years of completing a Masters in Ministry, I'm finding that everything I thought I know about being a pastor has brought me headlong into a storm that seems to be taking me further and further from the shore of church ministry. For some reason, I find that my life's testimony is more effective on a construction site than in a church classroom, and unsaved men are changing their behavior because I walk into a room. However, I know it is not me they are responding to, but the Jesus within me.

Only now am I starting to realize that Jesus doesn't need my boat - my education, teaching techniques, study habits, etc. - to lead me in His direction. And to tell you the truth, the vision I am now getting of God is scary, amazing, and unknowable all at the same time. I sometimes feel like I'm in the middle of a lake, pulling against the oars and drifting further and further from my goal. However, I know that one day I will arrive on the shore of His choosing, at the time of His appointing, to do the work of His anointing. We may not arrive there in my boat, but we will arrive there just the same.

Read: Philippians 4:4-9

A meteorologist in Mississippi went viral for uttering six simple yet profound words during his weather forecast on March 24, 2023. Matt Laubhan was tracking a severe storm when he realized a catastrophic tornado was about to bear down on the town or Amory. That's when Laubhan paused on live TV to say this prayer heard worldwide: "Dear Jesus, please help them. Amen." Some viewers later said that prayer prompted them to take cover. His spontaneous and heartfelt prayer may have saved countless lives.

Our prayers can make a difference too. They don't have to be longwinded. They can be short and sweet and can be said at any time of the day. Whether we're at work, running errands, or on vacation, we can "pray continually" (1 Thessalonians 5:17).

God loves to hear us pray throughout the day. The apostle Paul reminds us that we don't have to be prisoner of worry or fear but can take all our cares and concerns to God: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:6-7).

Whether we're enjoying a sunny day or being hit by the literal or figurative storms of life, let's remember to pause and pray throughout the day.

DRUMMER BOY

Read: Philippians 4:4-9

"The Little Drummer Boy" is a popular Christmas song written in 1941. It was originally known as "Carol of the Drum" and is based on a traditional Czech carol. Although there isn't any reference to a drummer boy in the Christmas story in Matthew 1-2 and Luke 2, the point of the carol goes straight to the heart of the meaning of worship. The carol describes how a boy is summoned by the Magi to the scene of Christ's birth. Unlike the wise men, however, the drummer has no gift - so he gives what he has. He plays his drum, saying, "I play my best for Him."

This echoes the worship Jesus described when He told of the widow and her two coins: "Truly I tell you, He said, "this poor widow has put in more than all the others. All these people gave their gifts out of their wealth; but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on" (Luke 21:3 -4).

All the drummer boy had was a drum and all the poor widow had were two coins, but the God they worshipped was worthy of their all. He is worthy of our all as well, having given His all for us.

Saturday ~ December 7

NEWS WORTH CELEBRATING

Read: 2 Timothy 2:8-13

For more than two centuries, the hymn placed first in the Methodist hymnbook was "O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing." Written by Charles Wesley and originally titled "For the Anniversary Day of One's Conversion," the song was composed to commemorate the radical renewal sparked by his faith in Jesus. It has eighteen stanzas proclaiming the glory of God's goodness to those who repent and follow Christ.

Such faith is worth celebrating-and worth sharing. In 2 Timothy 2, Paul encourages Timothy to remain steadfast in his faith and to persevere in sharing it. He noted, "This is my gospel, for which I am suffering even to the point of being chained like a criminal' (vv.8-9). Rather than second-guess his choices, Paul reminds Timothy to remember the good-news message: "Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, descended from David" (V. 8), came not to rule but to serve and ultimately to die for the sins of the world so that we may have peace with God. Death didn't win. Jesus rose from the grave.

And just as it set free those who believe, the message itself isn't bound. "God's word is not chained," said Paul (v. 9), not even from places where death seems to have won: prison cells, hospital beds, gravesides. In Christ, there's hope for all people. That's news worth celebrating!

Read: Proverbs 1:2-4, 7

The lord showed me a beautiful landscape that only God himself can create, as well as kept my grandfather, dad, and myself safe in the journey. He also guided me to the right locations to spot elk and learn from my mistakes so that I can become a better hunter. These lessons that he has taught me are the exact same lessons I need to apply to my faith in God. I have to learn from the sinful mistakes I have made and apply them to future, to help myself become a better Christian, and become closer to God. Even when bad things happen, we need to remember that God makes everything happen for a reason. He puts us in the right locations at the

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right times to have things happen that we will learn from to become better Christians. Even though it may not be the trophy that I had originally pictured, God truly gave me a trophy that is far better than antlers, and that is wisdom and guidance to bring me closer to him. We may not always understand why things happen, but God always has a reason for everything and you need to trust that he will always take care of you even when things seem impossible.

TAKE TIME TO BE STILL

Read: Psalm 73:28, Psalm 91:14-16, Psalm 139, Psalm 34:18, Psalm 145:18 and James 4:8

My husband has always had a knack for filling our house with just the right music. Usually it is jazz during breakfast - most often Vince Goudraldi Trio, with the Charlie Brown Christmas album coming out on Thanksgiving. Then it is often a new Christian song he's found after breakfast, and later in the day he might play a song "from the past" while we clean up from dinner. I can still hear America's "Ventura Highway" and see my little boys dancing around the kitchen with towel and plates in hand, and little Brooklyn doing what she could while she twirled to the music.

Sometimes my husband chooses a specific song, chosen by him to tell one of us something. Last year it was Touch the Wall, by Ben Shive for our son who swims. Then there was a song with a good electronic beat for our other son who is into technology. Often my husband will send me songs that speak into the season of life we are going through. Today I want to share two of those songs with you. I will put the lyrics below, and also links to listen online. I pray these thoughts and songs will encourage you and quiet your hearts in this season to ponder His nearness - our good - a gift He gave at Christmas.

The first song, "Be Near," is not a Christmas song, but it speaks of the nearness of God. My husband brought me this song during our first year of marriage, when I was pregnant with our first child, a baby boy. It would take pages to tell, but for now I will say that though our baby made it and he is now a thriving young man, things were not going well at the time. The prognosis was not good, and after our son was born, he spent four months in the NICU. When he came home I found myself the mama of a very precious, but medically fragile baby. Our son is truly a miracle, and God gets the glory for that. But those days and weeks and months were very hard. And in that hard season, God was near to me, to us, to our baby, daily meeting our practical needs, also giving us grace and peace and help and comfort "abundantly more than we could ask or imagine."

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My husband shared the second song, "Hush," with us during the pandemic. Everything was closed. You know this. It was getting closer and closer to Christmas, and how does a pastor hold a Christmas Eve service when the church is..."closed"? We recorded church from our home through a camera, and others recorded songs and readings to share, and our son put everything together and broadcasted Christmas Eve service through the computer. My husband included the song, "Hush", in the service. It says, "Holy in our hearts, holy in our homes, Glory's come down, heaven's come to us..." and God was near to all of us and drawing us to Himself...in our homes.

All of us have experienced God's nearness during hard times and we know others who have. It's a promise we hear at church and in our Bibles. We know He never leaves or forsakes us. We sure do want that and we need it, and we've learned, or are learning, that His nearness is our good. "But as for me, the nearness of God is my good..." (Psalm 73:28). Psalm 91 tells of the promises of His care, especially His very words to us in verses 14-16. Also consider His nearness told to us in Psalm 139, Psalm 34:18, Psalm 145:18, and James 4:8.

God is and wants to be near in our hard times - and also in our hidden, ordinary every day living at home, at our jobs, in our schools, in the car. God came near at Christmas, a gift given to be received with a thousand and more blessings in Christ, providing a way for us to be near Him.

I pray we can take time to be still this Christmas season, to "hush", savoring the season and pondering His desire and offer to be near. I pray He will be holy in our homes, holy in our hearts, holy - and so very near (thank you Lord Jesus!) - wherever we are and in whatever season we find ourselves in. Be blessed!

ADVENT

Read: Matthew 7:8, Job 1:21, Psalm 136:1

The Lord gave and the Lord has taken away; may the name of the Lord be praised."(Job 1: 21) The glad game may not be easy, but Job played it well (though the glad game isn't mentioned in the Bible). His sons and

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daughters were taken away from him, and yet he praised God. He was joyful through sorrow.

The fourth week of advent is love. It is a purple candle. One way to have love is to forgive. Another is to love God more than anything else. "Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good. His love endures forever." (Psalm 136:1) For the whole chapter, it says something and then repeats "His love endures forever". See how important love is? "Love your neighbor as yourself" is somewhere in the New Testament. It is repeated throughout the Bible.

The last candle is white. It is the Christ candle. For this one, just celebrate Christmas!

It read "Be sure you put your feet in the right place, then stand firm" - Abraham Lincoln.

This quote by one of our greatest presidents carries a lot of truth. It conveys the message that you should be aware of your position. Have you thought it through? Is it a position that you can uphold? Do you really have faith in where you are standing? If so, you need to stick to your convictions and not be moved. Although great advice, this statement can also be deceiving depending on what your viewpoint is.

What is the position that you are defending? How do you know whether it is truly right or not? What if the stance that you have taken is actually the wrong one? Many strong and intelligent people have found their selves on the wrong side of history believing that their stance was fully in the right. Thankfully, Paul's letter to the Ephesians lets us know how to be sure of our position.

He instructs us to "be strong in the Lord". (v.10) To "take up the full armor of God, so that you will be able to resist in the evil day, and having done everything, to stand firm." (v.13) Only by "being strong in the Lord" and looking to Him for strength and truth are we able to truly take up a firm stance on solid ground. You need to know His word, to accept it and to have faith in it. Jesus told us that "Therefore everyone who hears these words of Mine and acts on them, may be compared to a wise man who built his house on the rock." Matthew 7:24

Jesus is the Word of God. He is the Truth. He is the Rock. Trust in His words, place yourself on His foundation and then stand firm to the end.



The I means Important. God is so, so important. None of us are worthy of His love, but He chose to have mercy on us.


But wait! What does all of this have to do with what I'm talking about?

CHRISTMAS BELLS



Read: Isaiah 9:6

For many, Christmas is a magical time, created by the unique ingredients of faith, family, tradition, and a wonderful soundtrack. And every Christmas carol contributes to that soundtrack, lending it own unique story.

The carol "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day" is based on the poem "Christmas Bells" by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow. It was written the year our church was founded, 1863. This was a dark time. The cloud of the Civil War hung heavily over America where seemingly every household suffered the loss of loved ones and dreadful news of wounded sons, fathers, brothers, and husbands.

Longfellow's heart was heavy as he approached the Christmas season of 1863. His loving wife had died two years earlier. In addition, his son had enlisted in the Union Army and was severely wounded by a Confederate bullet. Receiving word of his son's condition, he searched among the wounded until he found him. He wrote in his diary that caring for his son and younger children took so much of his time that he had little time for his work.

As Christmas Day dawned, he struggled to find "Peace on Earth and Good Will Towards Men". Then, he heard the peal of church bells ringing, calling Christians to worship. He picked up his pen, dipped the quill in the ink, and began to write:

I heard the bells on Christmas Day, Their old familiar carols play And wild and sweet, the words repeat Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

While the Civil War ultimately ended, Peace remains elusive. We are bombarded daily with videos, pictures, and sounds sowing hatred, strife, and even war. He found the bells inspiring. We, however, can be (Continued on page 34)

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comforted by the knowledge that the words in his next to last stanza remain true

Then pealed the bells more loud and deep: God is not dead, nor doth he sleep! The Wrong shall fail, The Right prevail, With peace on earth, good will to men!

It's easy to get overwhelmed by feelings of hopelessness as we experience the tensions brought on by conflict around us and across the world. Let us remember that Jesus is still the Light of the world. In him alone is lasting peace.
