and only atoning sacrifice acceptable to God, taking on our sin as the true Passover Lamb of God, and by His blood alone, shed on a cross made of a tree (by the way we ate the fruit of a tree and died there), so that we would be forgiven by faith alone in Him. Now, when we are forgiven by God in Jesus Christ, no condemnation exists. The burden is lifted and removed. By what means? The cross. Now that we are forgiven, in Christ, we are cleansed, bought with a price, given value and life which we being dead in our sins did not have on our own, In Christ. When accusations **assail the heart, remember this...you are forgiven by God in Christ. Your** forgiveness was not earned by you. It never could be. It is not achieved **by you. You couldn't possibly ever be so. No, you are forgiven by faith in** Christ Jesus, by God the Father. His forgiveness is for eternity.

Have you ever noticed how the rain helps to melt the snow? The heat and life given off by the sun also melts the snow as well. This is true spiritually too. **The cleansing flow of Jesus' blood and the direct rays of the Son's light (for He is the Light of the World) melt away and cleanse us from** all the sins and burdens of yesterday, today, and the future. As the Scripture says, Jesus gives us lasting and eternal forgiveness. We are cleansed from all unrighteousness in Jesus. Do not live in the shadows of sin, sorrow, and the past. Instead come into the light, confess your sin, and be forgiven, forever.

This Lent let the cleansing work of Jesus sink deep with your heart. Live as one redeemed. Take time to worship, to pray, and to praise Jesus. **Make it your life's focus to spend each day you are given as one who** exists to bring Jesus honor and glory. For you are living by faith in Jesus, as one who is truly and forever forgiven.

# Holy Saturday ~ April 4

## FORGIVEN

Read: Psalm 130: 1-6

I have been amazed to see the height of the snow piles along the **roadsides, in parking lots, and yes, at my house this year.** It's hard to believe how much snow can fall quietly, softly, and over time. Before you know it the amount is greater than one expects.

Recently, I moved one of the piles over to free up some more space to move and walk along the pathways outside our house. Each shovel full I moved was heavier. The snow had packed down and been weighed down by more and more snow until the load became hard to move and, frankly, burdensome.

Spiritually, this is true in our lives. Sin makes a mess of our lives. It injures, divides, corrupts, and burdens with a heavy load the souls and lives of us as humans. On our own, we cannot lift the burden, free ourselves, move forward in newness of life and redeem each breath and step we take. The reality also exists that we must each give an account to God, for who we have been, who we are really, where we have been, and what we have done with the time we have been given to live. **We cannot escape this reality...the truth. We must give an account.** Now, we can ask others for forgiveness of our sins. We can pretend they do not exist. This is the path of self-deception. We can mask ourselves, insulate ourselves, try to put on good works. Yet, none of this will offer the forgiveness and redemption we need. Nothing can unburden the soul, when we look to other places and faces to do so rather than God. Nothing and no one can wipe our souls clean, cleanse us, and make us new, completely new, other than God.

**That's the good news, though. Sure it might not sound like good news at first, but it is.** We were dead in our sin, completely unable to do anything to save and redeem ourselves. We could not cleanse ourselves of our sin in any way whatsoever and make us new. Jesus came, God, fully God in human flesh and fully man, to do for us what we could not do. He, being sinless Himself, offered up His life as the one

## Good Friday ~ April 3

### SERVE WITH OBEDIENCE

Read: Exodus 3:11-12

In the eleventh century, King Henry III of Bavaria grew tired of court life and the pressures of being a monarch. He made application to Prior Richard at a local monastery, asking to be accepted as a contemplative and spend the rest of his life in the monastery. "Your Majesty," said Prior Richard, "do you understand that the pledge here is one of obedience? That will be hard because you have been a king." "I understand," said Henry. "The rest of my life I will be obedient to you, as Christ leads you."

"Then I will tell you what to do," said Prior Richard. "Go back to your throne and serve faithfully in the place where God has put you." When King Henry died, a statement was written: "The King learned to rule by being obedient." When we tire of our roles and responsibilities, it helps to remember God has planted us in a certain place and told us to be a good accountant or teacher or mother or father. Read: Matthew 4:1-11

Growing up I spent a lot of time in the wilderness. I learned to start campfires, gather wood, harvest game, learned to cook, and build shelters. I had no idea how important those skills would become in life. It was just fun to me. One thing quickly became apparent, being prepared was maybe the most important lesson that I had learned when spending time in the wilderness. Some years later, as I approached adulthood I found myself in a different kind of wilderness. One I was not prepared for. Life. The pressure to fit in, get ahead, and the temptations that go along with it. I was not prepared for this wilderness. Have you ever been in this wilderness?

Matthew 4:1-11 describes Jesus' experience in the wilderness.

1 Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted[a] by the devil. 2 After fasting forty days and forty nights, he was hungry. 3 The tempter came to him and said, "If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to become bread." 4 Jesus answered, "It is written: 'Man shall not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.'[b]" 5 Then the devil took him to the holy city and had him stand on the highest point of the temple. 6 "If you are the Son of God," he said, "throw yourself down. For it is written:

"He will command his angels concerning you, and they will lift you up in their hands, so that you will not strike your foot against a stone."

7 Jesus answered him, "It is also written: 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test.'[d]" 8 Again, the devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendor. 9 "All this I will give you," he said, "if you will bow down and worship me." 10 Jesus said to him, "Away from me, Satan! For it is written: 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve him only.'[e]" 11 Then the devil left him, and angels came and attended him.

Much can be gleaned from Jesus' perfect example as He faced the wilderness and Satan's relentless pursuit of his submission. Jesus was

Read: John 14:6



## OUR LOVING RESCUER

**Read:** Psalm 55:1-5,16-22

During a raging wildfire, a forest ranger saved a bear cub. At a recovery site safely away from those still fighting the inferno, he placed the rescued animal on the ground. Standing on its tiny back paws, the cub hugged the man's calf. The ranger gently pried himself away. Mouth wide as if crying out in desperation, the little bear clambered and clawed in an attempt to remain in the refuge of his rescuer's embrace. As the cub clung to his arm the kind man relented and rubbed his furry friend's head.

What if we pursued our ultimate rescuer—Jesus—with the same fierce desperation and confidence as the bear cub who pursued and clung to the one who saved him from death?

All people God made need saving. The psalmist David confessed his need for a rescuer—for God to hear and answer his prayers (Psalm 55:1-2). Admitting he faced troubles, threats, suffering, and fear (vv. 3-5), **David pursued God with assurance.** “As for me, I call to God, and the LORD saves me,” he said (v. 16). “Evening, morning and noon I cry out in distress, and He hears my voice” (v. 17). **David prayed continually.** He believed God listened and trusted that He would rescue him “unharmed” (v. 18).

When we face difficulties or suffering of any kind, like David, we can cry out to God. Our loving Rescuer, who pursues us, hears and saves us when we pursue Him too.

*Read: Isaiah 40:28-31*

I like to think that I am in pretty good shape for a man my age. Unfortunately, whenever I begin to do some serious physical activity, I realize very quickly how out of shape I am. Even worse, after several days or weeks of strenuous work, my body begins to break down. My muscles and joints no longer function as they should with fatigue and inflammation taking its toll.

I find this to be true in our spiritual lives as well. When I become distracted with the world and put my faith on the back burner, I tend to get “Out of shape”. My prayer life declines, my Bible reading suffers and as a result, my relationship with God becomes more distant and difficult to regain. Before I know it, I begin to wonder. “How did I drift this far?”

The flip side of this coin is fatigue. Sometimes after pouring all of our effort into our “duties” in serving the Lord and the church we may find ourselves burnt out. Year after year of trying to keep up with obligations can become taxing. Worse yet, we may even become complacent, wondering why we are making the effort to attend church and put in added energy when it seems as though we have done it all already. (I call this Groundhog Day apathy). The truth is, we as humans get tired. We get lazy. We lose focus. And we fall away from God.

To all of these problems there is but one solution. We must pull our strength not from ourselves but from God. He does not get tired or grow weary. He is the only one capable of providing the strength that we need to do His will day in and day out for our entire existence.

Why do we attend church? Why do we sign up to lead groups and activities? Why do we write devotions? It shouldn't be to show what good Christians we are. It should be in an effort to grow in our relationship with our Savior. It's not about our deeds; it's about our hearts. We need to do these things with our hearts rejoicing in and focusing on God continually. As we draw closer to Him, the more strength we receive. He is power without limit.

## LOVE WORTHY OF OUR LIFE

Read: Matthew 16:25

William Temple, a twentieth-century English bishop, once concluded a sermon to Oxford students with the words of the hymn “When I Survey the Wondrous Cross.” But he cautioned against taking the song lightly. “If you mean [the words] with all your hearts, sing them as loud as you can,” Temple said. If you don’t mean them at all, keep silent. If you mean them even a little, and want to mean them more, sing them very softly.” The crowd went quiet as everyone eyed the lyrics. Slowly, thousands of voices began to sing in a whisper, mouthing the final lines with gravity: “Love so amazing, so divine / Demands my soul, my life, my all.”

Those Oxford students understood the reality that believing in and following Jesus is a serious choice, because it means saying yes to a radical love that demands everything from us. Following Christ requires our entire life, our whole being. He plainly told His disciples, “Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me” (Matthew 16:24). No one should make this choice flippantly.

Yet following Jesus is also the way to our deepest joy. Life with Him, we’ll discover, is the life we truly desire. It appears to be a great paradox. However, if we respond to GOD’s love, believe in Christ, and relinquish our selfish, shortsighted demands, we’ll find the life our soul craves (v. 25).

Read: Psalm 34:18

Maybe for you, it is a loss, hurt, trauma, disappointment, or unfulfilled longing.**

Sometimes, it feels like all we can do is survive and exist. We take it one day or even one hour at a time. Jesus told us to expect trials and sorrows. Thankfully, He also reminded us that He'd overcome the world.

The truth is we don't know what will get resolved on this side of heaven. But we know the One who walks with us and weeps with us. And we can take Him at His Word. When I let my hardships define me, I have to stop and remember the truth. I remind myself who God is and what His Word says about me. For every pain we can think of, there's an attribute of God we can rest in—something that will anchor our souls to eternal truth.

Where people abandon, God never leaves His children.

Where people deceive and do not keep their word, God is steady and unchanging.

All His words are true.

Where death's sting is sharp, God is the comforter and sustainer who has already conquered it.

We can stay anchored by reading Scripture that reminds us how we're deeply loved. God created us in His image, giving us value, dignity, and worth—even if people have made us feel otherwise. Psalm

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And I, as the quiet girl God made me, right there in that quiet room, prayed that quiet prayer. I expected a sort of thunder clap experience, perhaps with lightning or a kind of extra-loud spiritual confirmation right there in my dark room, a rush of *something...maybe even angels singing.*

But there was silence.

Maybe, I thought, maybe I said it wrong. I know I meant it with all my heart, but maybe God was expecting me to put something more into it. Maybe my posture wasn't quite right. I tried praying again.

Silence.

I don't know how long I wrestled with the silence. I don't know how long I carried the confusion in my heart, but God in His grace and mercy led me to find Him in Scripture, particularly where He says, "if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord, and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you will be saved."

There it was, in Scripture, and that's what it came down to. Would I trust what He says in the Bible? Did He really mean what He said? Is it for real? Could God be trusted to save me? I would have to bank this prayer, and every prayer, on Him, and on the promises in His Word, not on my feelings, and certainly not on my good-doing. I knew I needed a Savior, and He would do the saving. I confessed and I believed.

I still do.

In the silence, I learned to trust Him.

The church my family attended was small, and it was just as quiet and predictable as our days. Started and ended with the same songs. Prayed the same prayers. Liturgy throughout, doxology after the offering, children dismissed to junior church during the pastor's quiet sermon midway, and called back in to end the service with our parents.

I learned Bible stories and Bible songs in Sunday school and junior church. Being good was especially encouraged. The only message I remember hearing from my pastor as a young child must have happened at VBS. **He taught us to sing "I have decided to follow Jesus" in Portuguese.** I sang it with my heart, and still remember the chorus. I wonder what else he might have taught us had we been allowed to listen.

**I don't have a memory of clearly hearing the gospel until I was 11 years old.** It was our youth leader who told us about our need of a Savior. I took this news home and thought about it. That night, I bowed my knees at my bed, and confessed to God my need of a Savior. I asked Jesus to be Lord of my life.

It was one of those quiet nights. They all were. Homework was done, dinner eaten, tv watched, horse hooves clip-clopped up the hill. Bedtime.

34:18 is a promise in the pain that God is close to the brokenhearted. This means He's close even if we don't feel close.

As we hold onto God's promises, practicing gratitude can direct our minds to the truths that settle our souls. Even when it feels like life has collapsed with an impossible future, God's character does not change.

I may not have the strength in my grief to thank God, but I can always thank Him that He's steadfast and full of love toward me. I can be grateful that He'll never leave me. 


## Saturday ~ March 21

### 3 TRUTHS THAT SETS JESUS APART

Read: Psalms 18: 2, 23: 1, and 27: 1 Philippians 3: 8

After leaving Sikhism for Christ, Sardu became an evangelist in India, who traveled from village to village preaching the Gospel. At a speaking engagement at a Hindu college, a professor asked him, "What did you find in Christianity that is so unique?" Immediately he responded, 'I found Christ.' Irritated, the professor pressed, "I understand, but what particular principle or doctrine have you found in Christianity that you did not find before?" Sardu responded, "The particular thing I have found is Christ."

The only uniqueness worth defending and even dying for is Jesus Christ. The heart and soul of Christianity is not just a religious system or ethical standards—it is Christ Himself. Christianity without Jesus is a dead corpse. Unlike all the other religious founders, His claims are true. His promises are sure, and His call is unmatched. We must say to those who call Jesus a great teacher—**those who imply He's a mere historical figure like Alexander the Great or Napolean**—no, Jesus is the only. He is unique. He has no peer, no equal, no rival. Jesus has no predecessor, and He has no successor.

In every generation, people seek to conform Jesus to their image—a milquetoast Jesus who makes no demands and accepts their will. They do not want the divine, eternal Son of God revealed in the Scriptures. But to truly know the King of kings, we must embrace the Truths declared about Him in the Bible. First, Jesus is the Lord. Second, He is the Savior. Third, He is ours. These three truths set Him apart from all the others.

1. **Jesus is LORD.** Jesus is God's full expression. He is God's own Son, the second person in the Trinity, who became flesh. He was there at creation; He is the sovereign ruler of the universe. Colossians 2: 9 declares that all the fullness of the godhead, that all the fullness of the deity, dwelt in Him bodily. He is the head of the Church, and He alone is LORD.
2. **Jesus is SAVIOR.** We are all born alienated from God, enslaved to self-centeredness, and at enmity with Him due to our sin. And because the wages of sin is death, we are born heading for hell and eternal punishment. But Jesus changed all this. When He became

The account of Adam and Eve is one of the best known and yet most misinterpreted stories in the Bible. The serpent misled Eve. But what if this story is about the tragedy of believing lies rather than about assigning blame or justifying a human hierarchy? I imagine this is what the garden of Eden was like, a foretaste of the reign of God.

Too often we are intentionally misled to believe that we can't fully trust God or that some people are superior to or more important than others. That lie leads us to suspect one another rather than accept God's assignment to care for all of His creations.

With so much pain and devastation in the world right now, I find this scripture comforting. We are like Jesus not only in the image of God, but also in our scars, bruises, and wounds.

In *The Wounded Healer*, Henri Nouwen argues that true ministry in a broken world stems from believers embracing their own vulnerabilities and wounds to generate empathy and connection with others.

The Gospel of John is filled with rich narrative and relatable characters. In chapter 19, the disciples were in hiding when the resurrected Jesus suddenly appeared to them. He walks in, and His first words to His followers are, "shalom," meaning "peace be with you." Then He shows them His hands and His side. Jesus is showing His followers His scars. Jesus then gives them a commission, "As the Father has sent me, so I send you..." What a magnificent moment! Jesus addresses His disciples with a moment of restoration and reality, comfort and confusion.

We are not perfect—we are far from it. But we can learn from Jesus that our pain, our scars, are critical parts of our journey. Even in Jesus' resurrection, he showed his human side. His flesh did not come back untouched. His experience left its mark. And so does ours.... Our scars, our wounds, our bruises are real. But so is our faith! And the intersection of our scars and our faith is where we find our own "Wounded Healer".

In John 20, we find Mary Magdalene weeping near Jesus' empty tomb. There she met a man who asked why she was crying. Thinking it was the gardener, she spoke with the risen Saviour-Jesus! Her sorrow turned to joy, and she ran to tell the disciples, "*I have seen the Lord!*" (v.18).

We too have the assurance that Jesus is risen! He's now in heaven with the Father, but He hasn't left us on our own. Believers in Christ have His spirit inside us, and through Him we have the assurance and joy of knowing He's with us, and we are "His own."



Conviction is given to us as a gift of shame and repentance; it is the great mercy of God. Jesus Christ hates the sin in people, and Calvary is the measure of His hatred.
